Salt Lake City contracted with V2 Analytics to conduct a cityw

Salt Lake City contracted with Y2 Analytics to conduct a citywide survey of Salt Lake City residents to:

- Measure the current mood of residents and compare to past years.
- Determine if city resources are aligned with residents' priorities and values.
- Implement citywide performance measures, maintaining historical measures where it makes sense for longitudinal comparisons.
- Validate the relevance of the communications messages coming from the city.

The intent was also to increase the usefulness of the survey as a management tool by transitioning public opinion research away from phone interviews and toward an online model that can still represent the city as a whole.

The survey was conducted over the month of June 2015. Letters were sent to 10,000 resident households, on city letterhead, signed by Jill Love, Community and Economic

Development Director. The letter invited residents to take the survey online at a custom URL. The survey was offered in English and in Spanish. <u>857 Salt Lake City residents</u> participated in the online survey.

Simultaneously, 8-minute <u>telephone interviews were conducted by a live interviewer</u>, <u>with 400 residents</u>. Telephone interviews were also offered in Spanish.

Survey results were made available via a Topline Report (attached) from Y2 Analytics, the first week of July. Representatives from Y2 Analytics will present their analysis of the survey results to the City Council at a briefing on August 4, 2015.

METHODOLOGY DETAILS

n=857 Residents in Salt Lake City Live phone interviews fielded June 16-26, 2015 Margin of error +- 3.35

For this survey 857 Salt Lake City residents were sampled from a list of Salt Lake City addresses purchased from Survey Sampling International (see sampling details below). Invitations to participate in the survey were sent to 10,000 households in Salt Lake City.

Sampling error is only one possible source of error in survey research. Results can also be affected by measurement error (e.g. question wording and question order), coverage error (e.g. counting as "likely voters" survey respondents who will not vote), and non-response error (e.g. the people who responded to the survey are systematically different from people who refused or were not reachable).

The data were weighted to reflect U.S. Census data from the American Community Survey. Weights were used to ensure that the data reflected as closely as possible the population of Salt Lake City, specifically in regards to age, race, gender, education level, homeowner status, and marital status. The data were also weighted to ensure that our sample received proportionate responses from each Salt Lake City Council District.

SLC employees are efficient and usually kind. LOVE Chief Burbank!

Every employee of the city that I have had contact with was polite and professional

They act like they don't care about complaints

The city needs to convert neglected tennis courts to pickleball courts.

I would really like greater attention being paid to the west side. We need things other than housing here. We need a better grocery store and at least a small amount of recreation/night life. We dont' have a single bar in walking distance.

Don't get put through to the responsible person.

To many resources allocated to bike lanes

1. I oppose any contributions to candidates because it sets up "the rich man wins" contest. Public money should be available for a one-time (or 2-3 at most) publication of candidates, issues and profiles to compare candidates before elections. I hate all the signs and flyers and I have to collect the flyers to review, study, and compare candidates. If a candidate is not well represented by numerous flyers, then it is hard to learn about them - which is why I suggest a one-time printed publication. Public and private radio stations and TV should also do a one-time debate which could be reviewed later on the net. The election process seems corrupt, confusing and a huge waste of money that could go toward better things than pursuing a job. 2. There are way too many bike lanes and they interfer with car traffic. 3. Sidewalks and streets underneath overpasses are NOT maintained well at all. It is a disgrace. 4. Public transportation is too expensive and too inconvenient to use. 5. SLC is large enough - quit trying to encourage more new businesses and housing. 6. The air quality is terrible but I'm not sure what to do about it since public transportation is so inconvenient and expensive. 7. The parks, zoos, and museums are great, but also too expensive. I know that I've complained a lot, but I think SLC is worth my concerns. Thanks for letting me air my complaints.

USUALLY COURTEOUS AND KNOWLEDGEABLE

I filed a police report. I was disappointed that the officers/detectives did not follow up on all the important leads given.

Workers with attitude are never good.

Salt Lake City needs more patrol officers on the street

No one followed up with me when I provided information about a dangerous situation regarding a broken tree limb.

Had to call the board of health about a condemned house across the street that at one point held as many as 25 people. Very disappointed with the board of health and their lack of response. Everything from drugs to prostitution to smuggling illegals into the house.

alot of the city employees are nice and clean cut A+++++

The police and park natzis are rediculous. They are only interested in generating revenue. Providing justice seems to be a nusance to them. They are not here to protect and to serve but to make money for the city or push people around.

Make public transit affordable for large families

the parking enforcement officers need to use more common sense

For the most part employees are great. My dissatisfaction is generally directed to lack of ordinances or bad ordinances.

I enjoy living in SLC, love Sugarhouse Park, love the area I live in. Not sure I like so much commercialism on 11th and 21st, too much traffic. Would like trax to go to Sugarhouse Park. Don't like what was done with Wal-Mart, it is an eyesore. Do think SLC Council is responsive. Don't appreciate what has been done with Chris Burbank, he was extremely helpful to our area with police presence and coming in to talk to us about thefts and car break ins in our area. Great spokeperson and close to neighborhood watches. Less commercialism in our area would be good. Area of 21st and 21st does not need to be commercial. Small businesses only.

not everyone seems to be on the same page; sustainability says something different than utilities, etc.

The Forestry Department is excellent

Police are slow to respond or just send you to a website. They are nowhere close.

There is absolutely zero support of the police department in our city. They are woefully understaffed. Even your questionnaire shows how little you care about crime and law enforcement in the city.

In general I have had a great experience in the 5 months I have lived here.



The city website is a pain to navigate, and when I finally found a contact number, it went to a vacation voicemail.

Bike lanes. They suck! No one uses them nor do the bikers obey the law. They ride on the wrong side of the steets on the sidewalks, they disobey the lights, they pop out of now where and then give you the finger. 3rd S/3rd E is a nightmare. I will no longer use those streets or shop the businesses there. The dollars spent on that street is a joke! I have NEVER seen a biker in one of these lanes. In the Avenues, snow removal has been the WORSE since Mr. Becker has come into office. I've lived there since 1989 and had no complaints until Becker came into office. I'm thinking he wants me to ride my bike to work on snowy days.

You should have just cancelled the \$15M bond and given up. We already have lots of soccer etc fields in the city. Stop pandering to minorities in the city as if they were the majority.

I've contacted the planning and zoning department with questions twice in the past year, and received outstanding service both times.

Empoloyees have been competent, courteous, and professional. Mostly this has been SLPD due to a vacant house next door.

Air quality air quality air quality - if this does not improve we may move for our retirement after living here 35 years

Most employees I have worked with have been great, though there are a few that can be quite condescending when you do not know the correct process/procedures, even when it is your first time encountering said procedure.

Despite my best efforts to comply with parking ordinances, I have been ticketed a couple of times due to very unclear signage. On both occasions, I was confronted with unsympathetic and uninformative personnel when attempting to discuss these tickets in the court or whatever it is. As a result, I avoid parking on the street in Salt Lake whenever possible.

they need to remember who pays their checks.

The parks department weed control was helpful bi addressing the weed growth/fire hazard in Wasatch hollow.....although the hazard still exists

The SLC Police Department does very little to address crime, especially theft in the Avenues. We recently had a car broken into and expensive items stolen, we found the posting for items on KSL classifieds and called to inform them. The said that we hadn't been assigned a detective but that they would pass the information on. The detective put on the case didn't call us until 2 weeks after the incident, he had JUST BARELY been given the case (SLC 15-1630) and said that he had several hundred other cases that he was working on and that he didn't feel that anything would happen with this one. Mean while, there were several other break ins on our street. We have people walking up and down our streets casing our cars and homes. We need neighborhood watch initiatives and better support from our law enforcement. We didn't even bother calling in when our other vehicle was broken into a month later because we knew that nothing would transpire from it.

always very helpful

The city forester has been very responsive when contacted about a problem with a city tree.

I see several parked at what I assume is their homes for hours during the day

Salt Lake City employees in my experience are friendlier and more helpful compared to other big cities, but there is also room for improvement. Court and police personnel in particular seem less patient and helpful than other city employees.

Parking enforcement officer was a putz.

I called to pay my state taxes and the woman helping me was very quick and pleasant

I needed to register my car and get a new driver's license at the same time. These two offices are in different locations in the city. This was unclear to me as I did a Google search for "DMV" and the first result instead directed me to the Driver's License Division.

The traffic lighting on Foothill Drive needs to be addressed especially at 1700 South and 1300 South. This is a major wait to access Foothill from either of those intersections.

Interaction with Salt Lake Employees have always been positve.

My concerns have been about just living safely in my neighborhood, which is close to the homeless shelter. Many mornings I have to step over people sleeping in the 5th Street Commons area and sometimes they are angry, hence I fear for my safety. I have called the police on several occasions, but the problem doesn't get any better. When will the city realize that the Gateway area is part of the city and needs city government help. One critical is to move the homeless shelters to areas where they can get the help they need. The city can't just foist this problem on the people living in the vicinity.

Have contacted urban forestry about the issue only to be given Mr. Bath's number, and the cycle begins again.

However, this past year I approached the zoning dept, and found the process much less responsive and client friendly from the sign in requirements to the face to face experience. Makes me hesitant to revisit this department in the future.

police and fire personnel are out of control.

I feel that the resignation of the police chief was a positive move for the City and I applaud Mayor Becker, who I don't usually agree with, for his actions in that matter.

No matter what the results of this survey are in helping the city move forward, I will not vote for Ralph Becker! He has been more worried about bicycle lanes than cleaning up the area around Gateway and has not connected the west side to downtown Salt Lake, Liberty Park and Sugarhouse communities. Tax money keeps getting funneled to improve the neighborhoods that are already nice, focus on improving Rose Park, Poplar Grove, Glendale and Gateway District should be a huge priority. Entire parking services team has always been helpful and responsive to my phone calls. House was broken into and the police officers that responded were great. The detective that took over the case was a complete waste of time.

I've called several times about a gas station/convenience store in my neighborhood that simply will not maintain landscaping and continues to post advertising all over the store and in other places. Housing and Zoning enforcement has contacted them, they will landscape and take signs down, then they let it all die and put signs back up. It's an eyesore and it seems that H&Z has given up as they no longer seem to be in contact with the business owners.

This is about the TB Health depatment. They help people with no insurance and leave people with insurance. My opinion on thios issue would be collecting a partial form uninsured person and helping a little to a insured person should help all persons Contact city regarding abandoned vehicle in my neighborhood. Vehicle was stolen and abandoned. Reported, investigated and vehicle towed away in all in one day. Excellent!

Not a problem with employees. I wanted to change my garbage bins, got the paperwork but never mailed it back so my fault. I have been disappointed in a rude employee, followed by non-response, from SLC parking on an issue where I was being harassed by somebody who did not want me to park in front of her residence, even though I had a city parking permit and was allowed to park there by law. This person was posting her own "no parking sign" in a city permitted area and calling parking enforcement when I parked there legally. The employee I spoke with on the phone was less than helpful and a little rude, and then a follow-up email describing harassment of this citizen was never answered by SLC Parking. It was quite frustrating at the time, although I no longer live in that area and parking was one of the main reasons I moved. Alternatively, a request for modifying timing of a traffic light was immediately answered and remedied; I was very impressed by the speedy and polite service by the traffic light folks.

My experiences have been positive



Some government workers present an attitude of disinterst and unempathetic to the current situation.

Mayor Becker has put far too much emphasis on his pet agenda items rather than on the issues of greatest importance to the majority. A good example is his obsession with the bike lanes and bikers. Another example was the ill-conceived and poorly communicated plan regarding the irrigation system upgrade to the Bonneville Golf Course. Only after threatening to get a legal injunction to stop construction so adquate input could be given by those most adversely affected, did we finally get the attention of the City.

I have contacted City Councilma Charlie Luke on a few occassionshis responses each time have been superb....he is an excellent representative of District 6....responses from the Mayor's office have been perfect examples of buearucratic insanity....totally lacking in common sense or cocern with subj issues.....

They are all nice, but (a few examples): Not all of them follow through on what they say they'll do. Also, many telephone numbers on the webiste are wrong, and I have advised the City of such, but nothing changes -- they are still wrong. Sometimes I get bounced from department to department because people don't seem to know exactly who does what.

HAND is perhaps the most frustrating department of City government. It appears to be a campaign tool for Mayor Becker, and less intersted in really addressing housing and community development issues like affordable housing and revitalization. HAND and the RDA seem top-heavy, driven by their own agendas and not those of the residents, and wasteful of taxpayer money.

Other than Chief Burbank the Police that respond to calls are pre-decided before investigating situations and often lie about the law or city codes. The zoning/building department (inspectors) are extremely bias based on personal feeling including gang like mentality. Complaints are filed based on inspector lies that citizens have made complaints. The whole department is self protective blaming citizenx instead of rooting out problem employees. Enforcement of zoning codes are very selective, a few citizens are constantly harassed (vendetta style) while most businesses are never cited for zoning violations. The same applies for building codes, the citizens (especially those seemingly on a unofficial list) are required to get permits that are overpriced (making repairs or upgrades financially difficult), then inspectors insist on compliance outside the scope of the permit. While businesses are easily able to afford permits and are many times never held to the standards of inspection that citizens are. One aggravating situation involves WATER. The city requires vegetation in landscaping and citezens are ticketed if the landscaping is not "green" enough, all the while we are in drought situations and the cost of water prohibits expansive greenery (especially on the west side where we are required to maintain VERY large parking strips owned by the city, many times larger that our own property).

Taking the time to educate and give options, as well as committing to address issues Paramount.

The one time I contacted the city was through an email to my council member's office. The response was very timely and complete.

I find the employees at the Water Department extremely difficult to work with. When they had a promotional sale on bus passes last year, they would not allow me to purchase one for my grandson unless he was with me and we had a birth certificate and written permission from his parent (my daughter) for me to buy it (as though I might be randomly buying a bus pass for some strange kid?). There were complaints that this promotional discount program did not work and got a low response; well, what do they expect when citizens get treated like a criminal for trying to buy a teenage grandson a bus pass. (He would have been the only one able to use it, as they would have had to put his name on it, so it was not as though I was trying to commit fraud or anything). Also, when I go in there to pay my bill, they are equally unfriendly, as though they are not required to show common courtesy or respect to the public, since water is not something we can do without, so what does it matter how they behave? That seems to be their attitude. I am also very afraid of the Salt Lake City police. I believe they committed murder when a SLPD officer shot that kid in the back at the 7-11 on 21st South and State Street last August. He was wearing a headset and did not



even know the police wanted to talk to him, yet, because he did not stop when commanded to do so, he was shot in the back. The recently released body-cam footage sickens me to watch, as the police officer behaves in an angry manner that this young man has the nerve to die on him, when in fact he is the one who shot him in the back. I truly cannot believe that Simm Gill cleared the officer responsible for this killing of any wrong-doing, because to me it's every bit as bad as any other police/citizen shooting that has been in the news lately. This 7-11 is less than 1/2 mile from my house, but I believe a handful of our city cops are over-reactionary, and would just as soon shoot someone as to stop and sort things out in a peaceful manner. These are the same group that speed through the city, runs lights, and come close to causing accidents with innocent citizens. If whoever is reading this has not seen that recently-released body-cam footage, I would challenge you to stop and look at it; you will be sickened by it, too. I also believe that the police and city employees have a lot less respect for those of us living on the west side of town than those living in the more affluent areas. I have been stopped on several occasions for running to the store late at night, and once they look at my license and see my address, I believe they show a real disdain for who I am according to where I live. One officer even said as much to me when I was stopped in a speed trap on State Street a couple of years ago. Another thing that irks me is the way everything is catering to the bicyclist right now. There is an area of the inner city (NOT a school zone) that is 20-miles-per-hour. That is ridiculously slow for a capital city traffic speed limit, and I feel it's been done to cater to the bicyclist, with no regard whatsoever for the motorist, and how unexpected this sudden 20-mile-per-hour area is. And what's up with this "Bikes 'n Beers" thing that the mayor's office was advertising? The last thing we need is a bunch of half-drunk bicyclists, yet all of the advertising encouraged, basically, a pub-crawl for bicyclists. I really dislike the fact that most of our major boulevards have been narrowed down to single-lane streets now, and the painting on the streets is very confusing to newcomers as to how they are to now yield to bicyclists. I think it's great if people want to cycle, but many of us NEVER WILL; what about us? Way to much attention is being paid to changing over all of our streets to suit the bicyclists, who are often careless, arrogant, and undecided as to whether they are a pedestrian or a vehicle operator. It also irks me how many of our left-land turn signals are never operating properly. We'vew put literally hundreds of thousands of dollars into redoing most of our semaphores, yet many of the left-hand turn signals appear to be randomly non-functional. Maybe it's a way of getting people to stop driving? Also, regarding the cost of taking mass transit. What incentive is there for people to pay \$5.00 per day to go to and from work on public transit she, even in a gas hog, they can drive for less? The greedy pigs that run this organization, many of whom will retire on \$200,000 - per-year incomes probably never use mass transit. Yet they have hiked the price up for the common citizen to insure that they continue to collect high salaries and retirements. And the fancy vehicles the UTA cops drive? Why not do away with all of these mass-transit cops, and just let people ride TRAX for free. We buy these expensive vehicles and pay these TRAX cops \$30,000 per year salaries to chase down people who are cheating on a \$2.50 fare. It doesn't make sense. Get rid of these cops and let everyone ride froo. Hire a few bicycle cops to patrol the parking lots to discourage vandalism, and you could run the whole system for millions of dollars less. And get rid of these UTA employees who believe they should collect these out-of-sight retirements. What have they done from day-to-day that is any harder or more stressful that what the rest of us do? I am a 64year-old citizen who frequently thinks about leaving Salt Lake because of the afore-mentioned issues, particularly the gun-happy police and the high cost of transportation and recreation.

Fund public safety before you finance legacy projects for the Mayor. No more streetcar add ons in Sugarhouse. Thank you.

I'm a bike rider and i use my bike as the main means of transportaion. Air quality is of utmost importance in Utah, which needs to be addressed not just by public transpotation and electric vehicles, BUT BY transforming the 7 or 8 factory poluters in the state to businesses that have citizen's concern including the mining which of-course are all out of the city's juristiction, non the less they are in Utah. If you can pass this info to State officials in hopes that they would do something about it. Thank you for this survey and caring to know what citizen think are important to them where they live, it would have been nice if State government would do something similar periodically as well instead of cozying up to big money and pluters in the name of economy. If the City would consider to do this survey periodically, i think the city (Mayor and the City Council) would win a greater respect from the citizens

The survey did not address some major issues like: Relocation of shelter, homeless people downtown, drug addicts, pan handlers, gang activity etc. Parking downtown is hardly available while blocks of real estate have been sitting vacant for well over ten years (arrow press, zephyr). Liquor laws.

It would be useful to define some of the survey items. For instance, I wasn't sure what you meant by 'neighborhood', what physical boundaries I should consider, so it was difficult to answer some of the questions. I was also unsure on what sustainability referred to.

City street are in deplorable condition -- 2700 South is one of the worst and has not been addressed for many years. Weeds and debris is taking over many of the sidewalks, curbs, gutters, vacant lots and 'parking' strips between sidewalks and streets. The area is looking more and more like a third world country. Bikes are not following traffic rules and are making it more dangerous to drive in the city. They fail to yield to pedestrians, fail to stop for traffic lights (sometimes merely switching from street to crosswalks).

I think the question about bike lanes was very poorly worded. I think they have made a mess with the bike lane (also enforcement of bike laws). The question was are there enough bike lanes - but I think there are too many (and I have neen an avid bike rider for decades). / / You didn't ask about opportunities for animals - like more spaces where dogs could be off leash - like even in my yard. The animal rights in SLC are awful. More dog lanes - less bike lanes.

Would like to see more tax dollars put towards education for K-12. Having only full day kindergarten available to a limited number of students resulting in parents paying tuition to provide full day kindergarten to those children is disappointing. Why should I have to pay tuition for public school when other public schools in other states can provide for all those children. More money needs to be contributed to the education of our young. We are very frustrated parents with the SLC public school system.

I would have liked to comment on Sugarhouse development.

Dear Salt Lake City: / / Please get rid of the blue parking meters! They are keeping people away from downtown. The recent improvements have barely improved anything. The city should not use parking as a way to fund city hall, it should increase the amount of on-street parking and decrease the cost of on-street parking in order to encourage more people to come downtown and to make surface parking-lots less profitable for the parking lot owners. / / I guess that wasn't a comment about they survey. I just needed to say that anyway.

Thanks for collecting public opinion, these surveys should be distributed and taken into account much more frequently! Great questions.

My business is in Park City and I commute everyday. Salt Lake City is where I could afford to buy so I live here. The most important thing for me is to feel comfortable in my neighborhood and to feel like my investment is a good one. My neighborhood has had a lot of crime. I believe an increased presence of law enforcement in our neighborhood at night would help cut crime or at least drive in out of SLC.

I think the questions about sexual preference and whether or not I feel I am transgender were uncalled for and you are going to use them purely for marketing purposes when it comes to telling others about our community. Those questions might have a place in a census, but not in a survey about city services.

It would have been nice to have been given an opportunity to explain why I rated certain items the way I did. For instance, I rated street lighting poorly, not because of the lack of street lighting but because I absolute PROTEST being charged a monthly



"fee" (actually a tax) when it is the city's responsibility to provide street lights that should come out of the city's budget rather than forcing people to pay an additional fee for something the city already is responsible for providing. There are a number of other items where it would have been nice to have been able to give feedback as to why I answered the way I did.

I strongly feel the State Prison should stay where it is currently located. The people who live in Draper should not have built their houses around a prison and expect the state to fund a re-location. It is their (the people who live in Draper) choice to live/work where a prison already exists. They should deal with their choice to live in Draper, or relocate themselves/business to a different location if they don't like being near a prison. Moving the prison to the airport area will only lower property values in that area and will be detrimental to the downtown Salt Lake City community. PLEASE DO NOT MOVE THE PRISON.

Your survey reflects what you are focused on in this city. You have all forgotten that families still live within the limits of the city. There is an increasing crime rate and the police department has zero resources. Our home as well as several in our neighborhood have been robbed time and time again. I appreciate the opportunity to respond in more detail. Had I known that was coming, I would have given the overall survey a higher rating in the last step. / One problem: A previous question asked for more detailed information about my opinion, yet the box in which the opinion went was only big enough to hold about three words. That made it very difficult to read what I was writing to make sure it was coherent. / / Overall, Salt Lake City is a great place to live. My main concern is the gradual squandering of irreplaceable amenities which make the city a unique and desirable place. I am talking about both historic architecture and our mountains. The damage gets done so slowly that it's almost unnoticeable. The large towers at the mouth of Emigration Canyon should have alerted us long ago to the danger of defacing our mountain views, the most important aspect of what makes Salt Lake City what it is. Yet I understand that a gated community is planned for the mouth of Big Cottonwood, something I find in comprehensively shortsighted. / / Similarly, the historic core of downtown has been broken up by the same tired old glass and steel towers which are quickly making large cities all over the world look exactly the same. Certain blighted areas of downtown could actually use a makeover, yet when choosing a site for UPAC, the city chose to tear down for beautiful and unique buildings right in the heart of Main Street. / The Pioneer architecture of Utah cities is as unique in its own way as celebrated architecture in Europe. Americans travel to Europe in droves every year to experience the beauty of European cities, yet we neglect our own equally beautiful downtowns to the extent that they have practically disappeared. / / I understand that large tracts of Sugar House are being bought up by individuals who, undoubtedly, will raze them so that they can make a profit on the typical shoddy garbage which litters the entire American landscape nowadays from coast to coast. I'm not against modern buildings. I am against the cheap Walmart look of disposable buildings which are essentially tin structures not intended to last longer than a few years. This sort of thing might be fine for business parks and suburban areas of a city. But our beautiful downtowns should be protected from this sort of thing.

I have lived in the north west section of the city center for about 25 years and it has been my experiance that the city really doesn't care what happens west of 300 west. The streets are barely lit at night and the residents are rarely cited if they dump their old mattresses, sofas, and televisions on the curb to rot. We have let the homeless situation ruin retail areas and deter people from coming to the downtown area to dine and shop. I really don't know what is going on with the parking debacle, but I must admit I love watching the bewildered looks on tourists and locals faces as they try to figure it out. Over all this city is trying to comeback from its existence as a virtual ghost town and I applaud that. However what it needs is stronger more empathetic leadership. Someone who can say no to the big business developers who want to move a prison. Someone with balls enough to tackle the increase of pan handlers and homelessness in the city. And it would be nice to have the city embrace the west side for a change and treat us like we are in the same city.

Poor air quality is our biggest problem. I do not feel it is very important to attract new business to our state, I have seen the problems brought by the growth in the last 30 years. I moved here for a job but also for the beautiful environment and what I expected to be clean air. There were a few weeks of winter inversion when I moved here. I believe that the air is much worse now. Although the increased population and automobiles are part of it, it is misguided to focus only on cars and mass transit. I consider industries the biggest problem. Unfortunately the city and state make little effort to curb industrial pollution. It is a disgrace.

If the state is not going to offer the health care it should, the least governments can do is help keep people from getting sick (through air quality, water and recreation).

I know you think this is a survey but have ear marked question was bad as I could not convey my true feeling a bouta couple of things. You guys think by sneaking the train around the corner of sugarhouse can keep it moving little by little. you need parking if people use this thing or at least use flex buses. For the extention that you say will be about 25million to do You can move buses a 100 years between the two point and make money in the long run. you will find it will be a mistake waiting to happen if you do it. I have lived here a long time and seen many changes but after being out in the world as I have I have seen things like this that people say they should not do and doing the train any further will be like what happened in Bremin Germany as the businesses went away and side street parking will spoil the close neighborhoods to the line. think about it as I have seen it in Protland and street is twice as wide then Highland drive is if that is why you wnat to do it. / / I have other stuff but Becker sucks as a Mayor in some ways and he just fired one the best policemen I have seen in my travels.

I think that the sugarhouse street car line was, and is, a complete waste of money. It travels past my house and I never see more than 3 or 4 riders at any given time. It has increased idle time, especially on 700 East, where traffic stops too often and therefore increases greenhouse gas emissions.

Review gender identification question. Give the ability to select 'heterosexual.' (Although I might have missed it, I skimmed it, as the question is irrelevant to how the city is run, no matter how much publicity the Mayor generates for himself.)

Exactly what is this survey supposed to accomplish? Who will use the results, what may change? Or, is this just another step in someone protecting their government job or turf?

The first part of the survey had the "Strongly Agree" to the left. The second half of the survey had "Strongly Agree" on the right. I almost didn't catch this and answered the questions opposite to what I would have intended. Also, the question about how long I've lived in Salt Lake City doesn't ask for the answer in number of years, which I assume was intended.

It was difficult to get in. Had to call the phone number for more specific instruction. As in any multiple choice survey, the correct/accurate answer to a question is often not among the choices offered. Therefore / the tiny box for comment was confusing and irritating. I suspect this is because folks who are paying for the survey are looking for specific answers to justify their thousands of bike lanes which are making it increasing difficult to move around town with anything other than a bike. Ever considered handicapped folks unable to ride bikes?

Not enough opportunity to write comments. I absolutely hate the new stoplight on 7th East just South of 21st South. Over a hundred cars stop for one person on a bicycle to cross. These pedestrians are not using the train, they just don't want to cross at the intersection of 21st and 7th. The train, when it does pass, is usually empty or has one or two passengers. / / The curbs and sidewalks in Sugarhouse are crumbling. 7th East is scheduled for new asphalt when what we have is fine...need to spend federal highway funds or loose them? / / As I said before, can't wait to leave SLC. Retiring soon and hope to never return here.

The final section of questions I consider outside the needs of the government. The state, local and / federal government have more than enough information about citizens.

The prison questions seem a bit self serving based on current events. A year ago it would have been fine.

The new parking meters are racket. (Especially the enforcement until 8 PM. It used to be 6 PM.) As a consumer, that discourages me from visiting the downtown area. Other than that Salt Lake is a pretty great place.

It would be nice to have the option of explaining or commenting on some of the answers after each question. I scored the parks department low because the park near my house is grossly over watered. The maintenance and amenities at West side parks is inferior with East side parks. I did contact the parks department about the over watering and had to leave a message. The person called back right away and was very friendly but nothing came out of the conversation. The park continues to be over watered.

Pretty frustrating to face such general questions. For example, I think Salt Lake is on the right path in many ways, but my impression is we are not preparing for the big economic crash I see coming. Many cities are already having trouble meeting expenses.

For yes/no type of questions your survey should add a comment box. Some questions left me wanting to answer yes or no but with qualifications. Unfortunately, I had no way add those qualifications.

You didn't touch enough on the value of the golf courses in this city. It is my sincere hope that you will leave them alone, give them enough capital to improve and thrive and keep them open for a multitude of years. When you consider the number of parks, dog parks, etc in this city and compare that with the tiny number of golf courses, it is a no-brainer. Leave the golf courses alone, please. If not, I'll happily accept a one-time payment from SLC in the sum of \$80,000 so I can join the SL Country Club, which will stop me from playing any SLC course ever again. Your call, amigos.

I am using this space for a complaint. 1. I will not use a credit cars for parking. The expectation that it is safe is ridiculous. 2. To

Dividing priorities into more or less important categories probably prompted me to some false choices. There were few, if any, areas of expenditure that I would not support in an ideal situation (i.e., one in which valuable goals were not in competition with one another).

Legalize recreational marijuana. Colorado has so much money from doing this, you guys would be serious fools to pass up this opportunity, regardless of your moral or religious beliefs. / / Imagine a time in your career where you don't know what to do with so much money... / / Seriously.

Where to start... / --WHY,WHY,WHY?-- / You ask lots of things about "do you feel safe?", "does your neighborhood look nice?", "How do you feel about the library?" but you give no opportunity to specify why we feel that way. This is either out of a lack of knowledge about how to write useful surveys, of because you don't care. I imagine it's nice to be able to say things like "We need to pass this city ordinance because, look, people say they are dissatisfied with this related service" rather then haveing the burden of knowing exactly why people are unhappy. / For instance, the library. I picked one of the less favorable options, but you don't ask why. It could be because I think there is poor selection for books, or it could be that although the place is beautiful and well-stocked with wonderful books, homeless people essentially camp out in there and take baths in the bathroom sinks. (Hint: It's the latter) / The same goes for many of the items, one of the biggest problems with the safety, parks, public spaces, etc. in my area of the city is the morass of homeless people. Have you driven down 5th west or Rio Grande south of the mall? It looks like a scene from a zombie film. Shabby, smelly people meandering in the middle of the street, making temporary structures (tents, shacks, etc.) in the parks or in the median. It's horrific. My neighborhood isn't "walkable" (as you ask) because there are so many homeless over here and it only gets worse during the summer. They smell, they don't follow rules like not peeing in the street, not walking down the middle of the street, etc. they constantly ask for money. I swear, I used to live in NYC and I get hit up for food/money more during the 3-block walk from my office to my apartment than I used to walking the entire length of Manhattan! / --Moving the prison-- / You ask how I feel about moving it from where it is (not the SLC limits question), but you don't give an option for "No preference" and you don't supply any info. Absent information like the amount of money the state will make off selling the land, I really have no preference about what happens in Draper, I don't live there and I don't know anything about the financial effects it will have on the state. / -- Transgender and Orientation-- / There is no way this isn't going to be horribly skewed. There are so many closeted people, especially in Utah and they are unlikely to say "sure, I'm gay!". Also



people that feel strongly that you should not label people with things like gay/straight could say "prefer not to" in protest. Conversely why would any straight, non-trans person say "prefer not to say". /

My only concern is that the survey contains too many concerns about housing development at the expense of green spaces. the questions I didn't answer I couldn't on my phone.

- Comment for Salt Lake City - DO NOT raise taxes any more, we are already taxed too heavily (unless a "head-tax" is considered for families with school age children, but NOT taxing families with no school age children) /

Add Atheist/Deist/Agnostic as a discrete option on the religious demographics portion.

There should be an area where initiative suggestions can be made. For instance, there should be an opportunity to identify the importance of keeping SLC's green spaces green. The current trend to allow golf courses and parks to brown in the summer is contrary to good management practices and is not necessary to enhance the principle of water conservation. The city has made important investments in these public and community benefits and the city should protect that investment by keeping the parks in good condition.

Some of the issues seem to be a bit vague. I am not sure what is meant by "sustainability issues". Maybe some explanation might be in order. / I have also had several interactions with city government and there was no way in the survey to indicate that. I was very pleased with the urban forestry division who removed a dying tree and the stump from our parking strip. Not so pleased about the fact that drainage issues from the ward parking lot down the street have not been corrected.

I would love to see a decrease in taking away driving lanes in order to increase bike lanes.

Regarding the prison in Draper â€" I know people who work there and have moved to be close to the prison within the last 10 years. People who work in the prison every day say that 3 buildings should be updated but they think it is adequate. And that would certainly cost lest than the millions plus that moving it would cost. It's pretty obvious that some high-rollers bought property close to the present prison and are pushing to get the prison moved out of the way of some lucrative business deal.

Some answers should be allowed to be neither rather than yes or no. I hate the roads have been narrowed to one lane (which backs up traffic and causing huge delays in getting around) for bike lanes outside the downtown area. / The survey was unimpressive as far as coverage.

I was disappointed that the survey did not cover what is important to me. The City is anti - child. The decision to close two golf courses is a case in point. Another is the move towards putting bars in family neighborhoods. I lived in Palo Alto for several years. The residents there would never condone such anti child policies. Keep that direction and the entire city will be a slum. In several of the question - like the one about \$500 limit on political contributions only 4 choices - what if I don't have an opinion on the question - I don't support or oppose it - I don't know enough about the idea to say yet - if individuals have a \$500 limit - do businesses have the same limit. If not then I STRONGLY oppose , if businesses have the same limit, then I might be in favor - but I would have to think about it. And even then I still need a Don't oppose or favor the idea.

I think this survey is Becker's way of getting re-elected and is all "for show."

The majority of the questions you asked were about the environment, recycling, bikes, etc. Why isnt the city more concerned with attracting good paying jobs and creating businesses?

Air quality is the most important thing. That is the only thing holding this city back.

Thank you for asking about the kiosk parking fiasco in downtown SLC. You could have delved a bit deeper into that one. By doubling the price and pushing the inconvenience to infinity, some of us elders have chosen to go elsewhere to shops and events. If the city wants to know why older people who used to go downtown no longer do so, ask a few.

Many questions seemed designed to elicit a certain kind of response or validation. Is the city, for example, hostage to the notion that the concept of "sustainability" is either widely understood or subject to common understanding? Asking people whether they are in favor of cleaner air seems rather silly. I would prefer to have had a question regarding a specific initiative regarding airquality. I will be curious to see how the results of the survey are applied to city business. I would hope there is no political motives underfoot, to reinforce the rather doctrinaire position of current city administration.

You may want to rephrase some of your questions as there were some that had double negatives.

Very well put together survey. Clearly some specific issues are being addressed, and i do believe that the services provided by my tax dollars are doing a good job, however just wish that as i do not have, nor will i ever have children, that my tax dollars went

My property taxes seem to be extremely high compared with some other cities. This is not mentioned in the poll. My property taxes seem to primarily fund children going to school. Maybe if people want to have more than 2 children they should expect to pay more of the burden rather than mooching off the rest of the community to pay these fees for them? I won't be able to afford the property taxes when I retire. / Nothing said about investment in high speed internet and creating competition. Why are our rates for internet so high? / I think we need more space. Too many businesses and homes packed in together. This creates high volumes in traffic and walking and biking become dangerous. / I seem to be constantly waiting for the light rail trains to go by lately. This is creating problems for traffic. Building another one in Sugarhouse seems like a really bad idea to me. No mention of this in your poll. / West Valley does a pick up of items once per month according to a friend of mine. SLC does this once per year. Once per month seems excessive but biannually might be nice. /

I don't always feel safe getting out my wallet and stumbling around trying to make the system work. I'm a smart, quick, active person, if I don't like the system, I wonder how seniors in the community manage it. P.S. Thank you for asking. I appreciate having the opportunity to give my thoughts about life in SLC.

Keep doing a great job! While it may be difficult to find someone who agrees with everything you're doing, it's most likely that most support most of what you are doing, yet may be rather vocal about a specific issue. In general, we support your efforts!

I feel that the city should invest in improvements on the west side. I keep hearing that North Temple is to be the new "Grand Boulevard" and that updates along that route will be happening. We need coffee shops, deli's, restaurants - more like Downtown SLC. Hopefully this will happen. People live and work on the west side - I have done both for 35 years. At one time there were several restaurants and the area was vibrant - now it is fast food and very few restaurants. Our company guests ask for the nearest coffee shop or deli, and we say Downtown - not so convenient when company location is near the airport. Wake up SLC District 1 - fight for your tax paying people.

The city should not close golf courses other than Wingpointe which should never have been built if the city didn't own the land. The Golf enterprise fund should be done away with and the golf courses moved to the Parks and Recreation general funds like many other municipalities. Golf should be sudsidized the same way parks, trails, tennis courts, open spaces, disc golf, and soccer fields are. The argument that a limited amount of people golf does hold up considering the aforementioned activities are only utilized by small subsets of the population. Additionally how can there be true cost savings when the city will still be required to water, maintain, and police golf courses that are converted to open space. Closing golf courses also hurts the property values of the surrounding neighborhoods as well.

I wish I could have made more comments with some of the answers - just for explanation.

There are absolutely not enough street lights on any road or freeway and no lighting on street signs. There is no reflective properties to the road paint. All of these things make it very hard to drive and see in wet and snowy weather conditions. I would love to see more covered parking options at schools stores and housing/apartment parking lots.

I would like to have had the opportunity to rate parking meters and bike lanes. Hate both.

When asked "if the prison were to be moved north and west of the airport", the answers were all whether or not we were opposed to having the prison in "Salt Lake County". I am probably okay with it being north/west of the airport but not okay with it being, say, on Redwood Road or in West Valley. I also think there was no way to really stress how important I feel about improving air quality. Poor air quality is the single most significant factor in me wanting to move out of Salt Lake City.

The questions about "how safe do you feel walking alone (day/night)" seem to be about personal safety from crime, such as



mugging. However my greatest source of anxiety about safety while walking alone is related to unsafe street crossings as a pedestrian. Our feeling that our lives are in danger while crossing streets in Salt Lake City is one of my family's most negative feelings about the quality of life here. I think the survey should have included more questions about pedestrian and bicycle safety.

Some of the questions need to have an area to add comments. Like my dissatisfaction with the street lights or that one of my kids walks the other would take the bus but cant because of the bell schedule. Next time let the respondents have a way to communicate the whys of what they like or don't like. Good Job!

I hope my selections and comments will be taken seriously. We'll see ...

The questions seem to be slanted toward a bias of things that the survey considers important and does not allow expression of opposite opinion. For example, if we feel that there are way too many bike lanes to the exclusion of convenient traffic movement, there is no way to indicate another opinion. Or if the kiosk parking is inhibiting older people from even coming into the city because they do not have comfort with technology, that may be a very important issue, but not possible to express in the way the survey questions are asked. All surveys have this problem to some extent, but this one felt very tilted toward a liberal agenda.

This survey was pretty slick and easy to use.

Some of the questions don't have clear cut answers. It would be good to allow for this.

Too many unrelated personal questions

The survey asked me questions about my neighborhood but provided me with no space to respond about what I am concerned about in my neighborhood and it didn't allow me to respond about what I was dissatisfied with in my dealings with city government offices. My biggest concern about my neighborhood and the city is that the historic district requirements on my block are punitive. There are ugly concrete high rises on my block and lots of post-original construction, but I am intimidated and asked to adhere to window requirements from 100 years ago even though no one ever receives a citation for not obeying these rules on my block. It is punishing to those of us who actually try to get permission to put new, more efficient windows on our houses, which we can barely afford to keep in livable conditions in the first place because they are 100 years old. I spent 4 months trying to get permission to put a new window in an upstairs bedroom that no one can see from the street and was denied. The beaurocracy and time that goes into investigating, contacting, fighting, and not giving permission to people on this block costs the taxpayers money for absolutely no return and is a travesty.

None of the initiative ideas were "not important."

Other issues outside of the overall competency of this survey - Dog parks on the east, but not on the west side. Not cleaning up the Gateway District as promised years ago has hurt quite a few small businesses and restaurants along with the major ones that used to be in the area. Spread out the homeless shelters instead of them being all congregated in one area has been a huge setback to the downtown Gateway/Pioneer Park area. Not having enough east to west traffic flow is a set back in improving the west side. Just about every bridge over the railroad tracks is also an on/off point for the freeway, which further slows down access for people from the west side to downtown area. Lights at a few intersections need to be improved 300 S. 200 W. (too long east to west), 200 S. 200 W. (too long east to west), 700 S. 200 W. (too short north to south), 900 W. 200 S. (too long north to south), all lights on 1300 south need adjustment (hopefully this will be fully fixed when they get the railroad overpass completed). Air quality is the number one issue facing residents of Salt Lake City, and it is the only thing, for me, that detracts from the quality of life here. All other issues are secondary to the air quality problem. It is a public health concern, environmental concern, quality of life issue, and new business generation issue. And although Salt Lake City cannot fix the problem alone, it can and should take the lead in finding workable solutions to the problem. We need to figure out ways to get people out of cars and off the roads. Less money for highways, subsidized fares for public transportation, more bike friendly streets and laws (Stop signs as yield signs for bikers, anyone?) We need to make alternative transportation cheap and attractive and single driver highway use expensive and slow. There have got to be solutions to the air quality issue. Salt Lake will die a slow death if air quality is not addressed in a meaningful and effective manner.

Only suggestion is more police or parking oversight on Sundays at Liberty Park on Sunday. It's getting more and more crowded with cars being parked on the sidewalks and the grass areas plus more "fights" around the drum circle this year than past years. I love the park and we spend a lot of time there and want everyone to be able to enjoy it while following basic parking and safety rules.

As a downtown resident I feel like this survey would have been a good opportunity for you to receive the opinions/feedback from myself and others about the homeless population. I'm not all that bothered by the homeless, but the panhandling is a different issue.

The Mayor and City Council ask for input, then make their own decision.. For example, Walmart on Foothill could be a lovely facility if they had been grated license to rebuild. Many of us spoke against the Sugarhouse Trollley, but it was built and 11th East is not a good choice. Then we are told there is no money for infrastructure, therefore we pay a fee for lighting. Let's put our tax dollars into fixing infrastructure rather than adding trolleys and then beautifying the path. I have watched and there are very few riders. The parking meters cost millions, don't work and were an unnecessary expense.

I do not have comments regarding the survey but have been meaning to call the City to give my thoughts on 300 South and the bike lane. I recently received a ticket on 300 S, I thought I was parked in spot but it turns out I was not. That entire street is so confusing. My husband told me that when they added the lane, there used to be photos of how to park. Obviously if you have to have photos, it's too confusing and now that they are no longer there that is a problem. Also, I rarely even see bikers using the bike lanes. Is it truely needed?

SLC is on the right track with bike lanes, sustainability, parks. / / Glad to see the Hive Pass is back. I bought summer youth passes for the kids and am tracking to see if they are used enough to be worthwhile.

you have not addressed the problems of the city!

One comment regarding the public transportation section - you're missing an important question. For me, the buses go where I need them to go, but too many transfers are required to make it convenient.

My living experience would be rated above 90% if the air quality issue could be improved. This is a great city! I would love to see city glass recycling instituted. I would also like to see the bicyclists controlled-I know it's hard to share the road with cars but they fly through stop signs and turn left in front of vehicles. It's horrifying! They make their own rules based on their convenience.



Very biased and irrelevant survey. Many of the questions assume that you endorse something. For example, you are asked to rate the availability of bike lanes. There was not option to indicate that one does not like the bike lanes which is my opinion. When developing a meaningful survey, one must allow all opinions to be voiced and not simply guide the respondent in a desired direction. If I answer 0 to the bike lane question, it implies that more bike lanes are needed. If I answer 7, it implies I am pleased with the number of bike lanes...neither is correct. One person could indicated strong agreement with the business/residential mix in an area and mean that he is happy with few business and a lot of homes; his neighbor could answer exactly the same way and mean exactly the opposite. Very strange survey.

Please continue to expand the availability to obtain public feedback through these forums.

There is such a strong minority bias in this questionnaire. Less than 2-3% of the population has a non-traditional gender identity, but we are pelted with questions about transgender and gender-identity that should have nothing to do with this kind of survey.

Instead of asking for our "race" or "color" how about asking if we are a natural US citizen or here on a VISA or visiting?

Not pleased that I was asked personal questions such as income and hetero/homo preference. Some of my issues were not addressed such as Becker's insistence that SLC build a new performing arts center when our schools and roads are in terrible shape.

For a better Salt Lake City: / If you want more people to head downtown for evening activities, you should make parking easier. PLEASE move the free evening parking hours BACK to 6:00 pm. If you want more people to head downtown for evening activities, you should make parking easier. The [new] parking kiosks are [STILL] cumbersome, confusing, expensive, and difficult to use. / If you want to balance the City budget, place deputized officers just south of the intersection of 1300 East and 2100 South. Have them issue \$100 tickets to everyone who runs the RED Left Turn light (turning from west to south). Voila! Budget problems solved. I've seen as many as four cars at a time run the light. I've seen a cement truck followed by an RV run the red light. I've seen school buses run the red light. / PLEASE stripe the lane leading into Sugarhouse Park southbound from 1500 East - perhaps with dashed lines across 2100 South. The currently-indicated correct lane from which to do this is NOT the one that lines up with the Park entry lane. Drivers exiting the Park to the north and turning left (west) cannot see that the lane directly facing them is the one that will zigzag in front of them to enter the Park. Either that or mark the southbound 1500 East lane that lines up with the entrance (the right lane) as the correct lane from which to enter the Park. I've seen cars from both southbound lanes (right and center) try to enter the Park at the same time, and I have seen southbound and northbound cars (turning west) dodging each other in the center of the intersection MANY times. Both conditions are accidents waiting to happen.

I grew up in Salt Lake and have returned (temporarily I hope) after many years. I think that Salt Lake is making some of the same mistakes that Seattle, my former home, is making in terms of encouraging and signing off on too many high density living spaces without considering the volume of traffic and other sorts of pressure being put upon neighborhoods. I gave the police department mostly poor marks because I am truly shocked at the lack of enforcement of traffic laws. The misbehavior of Salt Lake drivers is appalling.

People need to know they / must spay or neuter animals. Too much money has been spent on trax. Natural gas buses would be / better and less expensive and not interfere with businesses.

Like how we feel about some of the questions that have more direct issues towards things. Things that we might have issues with more than others and feel that we whould like resolved. If any of this makes any sense.

Transgender questions! Really? Also, what does a sexual preference have to do with any question on your survey. Handle the basics of city governance and leave the rest alone.

This is a weak survey. "Is the city going in the right direction?" "Services to taxes?" are both questions that are throw aways. Questions about my neighborhood??? How do you define my neighborhood? The block? The surrounding blocks? Sugar House? The southeast side?/I appreciate the effort. I hope this doesn't carry too much weight.

It would be important for me to hear back about any decisions that were made based on the responses from this survey. This ensures that future surveys we receive actually matter to government officials. Hopefully there will be regular surveys to help city government receive regular feedback from the citizens who live in Salt Lake City. As the city continues to grow, traffic management needs to be addressed in certain residential areas. Foothill traffic is worse and alternative routes need to worked on to relive this area. Residential citizens in that area suffer and the businesses do also since it is too congested and people do not want to get near that area at certain times. It would also be great for the city to support more Farmers markets around town. They are a much needed and welcome addition to support the local food market and offer natural and healthy food options that



we desperately need. We only have Whole foods and Sprouts in this area - not very impressive for a city of this size. We are an educated population base and know that food and water and air quality matter! Let's invite and support more businesses to expand the natural food market.

My number one concern, by far, living in SLC is air quality. I am asthmatic and severely impacted by the poor air quality. Within the next 10 years we will likely move from the city, and the Wasatch Front in general, specifically because of the poor air quality and the impact it will have on shortening my life due to respiratory damage. With such a move we take both our business and tax dollars with us to another community.

Some of the response options might have been better as "I don't know" (especially those with "neither agree or disagree")

Nowhere does this survey address the issue of panhandling, which to me is the biggest detriment I have seen in my 5 months of living here. I grew up in a much larger Midwestern city and there was never this sort of culture of begging as goes on here. If this city wants to improve its social climate and make things more inviting for residents and visitors alike, clean up the bums and beggars off the streets. And that problem is not limited to downtown.

The survey did not allow the user to express a complete opinion. Multiple choice answers are not enough. Users should be able to explain why they selected a certain answer.

I feel some questions were a little bit vague and that, perhaps, this may yield some false information.

Surveys like this where you simply click on circles are inherently skewed by the very wording of the questions. More importantly, issues I find bothersome aren't even addressed: 1) too many bike lanes in all the wrong places; 2) new parking meters (unnecessary and a waste of taxpayer money); 3) each household paying for 3 recycling cans when not all neighbors need that many and would share; 4) too much emphasis on sexual orientation; and 5) most important, Mayor Becker continuing to push for TRAX running north on 11th East when it would serve the East Side better to study the possibility of running it north on Foothill Blvd. Most disheartening to me--these comments will most likely be disregarded.

Bike lanes and reduced traffic lanes create more congestion (and more pollution) than the reduce. Fair consideration should be given to getting ALL traffic through the city, not just the "Green" types. Purposely congesting motor traffic results in increased idling, longer waits at crossings and an increase of negative feelings towards the cyclists (and accompanying road rage).

Some assumptions were made in the survey questions about what I value. The one I remember was that I value bike lanes, which I do not.

Questions regarding the monopoly on alcohol sales in the state should be present. If the state is allowed to have a communistic approach to the sale of one item, even if it considered a controlled substance, why would they not create a monopoly of others? Say, state run pharmacies? The DABC is a mismanaged and awful group that holds and illegal monopoly. This must be changed. If private liquor licensing were available the funds from the sale of the current DABC store properties could help fund things like education and better public transit. It would likely be more profitable as it would still gather all the applicable taxes without the management of properties and employees.

You are doing great!

The survey, although easy to complete, is clearly biased. There are choices available that are not listed (such as to increase the investment in golf courses and not require them to be self supporting). That was not listed as an option. A couple of other examples: there is an option to increase investment in K-12. This SOUNDS good, because we all support funding for schools. However, schools are funded by state and by property taxes, not by the city. So why have it on the priority list? Another example is the state prison. If the prison does indeed move (which I do not support), I don't mind it being in the city. But I do NOT want it near the Great Salt Lake in the proposed north and west location. However, I was not given the option to explain this choice. So, in short, I believe this survey is biased toward promoting certain responses, which may not reflect the true feelings of city residents. Listen to the constituents that attend public meetings to offer their opinions.

There are bigger fish to fry, absolutely, but I want to put my two cents in about the stoplights. I think, in a city that has (at times) some of the worst air quality in America, cars idling at incredibly long stoplights is an issue that is consistently overlooked. (2 cents). Thanks for the survey, its great to be able to express how much we love SLC.

It should include questions about the pacific rail lines that run through the city, especially ones that do not have quiet zones institued yet. I hate those noisy trains, especially since I live 40 feet from them.

One of your questions asks about activities in the last 12 months, but has an option for "less than once a year" as well as "never". Given the 12 month criteria, they would seem to be equivalent, but apparently you do not consider them to be. That is not very clear what you want.

I've lived here for so long that I wouldn't move, but I haven't been entirely happy with the way Big Brother has done everything either. You just have to go with the flow.

I wish it had asked: What city action are you most angry about? Answer: The shameful way the city treats it's golf courses. In particular, closing Glendale golf course and keeping Rose Park. Glendale is profitable, is a much better course and how the best practice facilities in the valley. Rose Park is none of those.

Address the problem of the homeless all in one area -- on 2nd S and 400 West. It is a nightmare driving in that area and a real



problem having so many of the shelters all in one location. They should be spread thoughout the city more.

Thank you for giving Salt Lake City residents and tax payers an easy way to voice options about local government.

It may have been nice to include write in sections for people to put their thoughts or concerns.

I find the lack of attention for education/schools in SLC to be disappointing. It is a known deficiency around SLC (as opposed to a higher tax base like Park City) that our public schools rank poorly across the rest of the country. Education should be a more prominent component of SLC's and UT's future as it relates to investing not only into its population (as opposed to street lighting, snow removal, sidewalks and bike lanes) as it is a huge detractor for young professionals. We have considered moving to PC as it relates to air quality and schools. Many professionals look to Denver and other mountain towns based on education considerations for starting a family and still maintaining an active lifestyle.

Thanks survey! One thing that I would love to see is more patrolling at night. We've had so many car break-ins on our street and burglaries. It's the only thing I dislike about living here.

You need more questions that people can respond accurately to. I live on the west side of town and many of the questions about transportation and housing, etc. do not apply to me but are important for those who need public transportation and housing. There is a serious need in this community for both. We have many issues on the west side that have not been addressed by our current council man. Actually, he is a joke and an embarrassment to this area. Things that would help us he rejects and things that are good he wants to take away--like the golf course.

I was excited to participate in this survey as I feel like I live in the greatest "downtown" neighborhood! This survey was quick and easy and asked the questions that really matter!

Don't drink the kool aid that society is making so palatable today. Be prepared for what we might not have tomorrow, learn to do without and take care of the poor and hungry.

If the bikes aren't using the sidewalks, they're still on the road. No one is using the bike lanes as appropriated. Not making a ton of sense to me.

The survey does not allow me the space to comment on issues outside of the survey. Specifically: / / We need more of a police presence in the Ballpark (1300 S) area. There is a lot of foot traffic from the probation office to the TRAX station and litter is a problem. There is a lot of drug use at the 1300 South TRAX station. There is also a large pothole on the westbound portion of 1300 South where it crosses TRAX.

Regarding sidewalk maintenance, a neighbor of mine in the Liberty Heights area has been requesting assistance with the sidewalk/street in front of his house for the last several years because it has been steadily turning into a sink hole. He has received unsatisfactory response from the city and feels there is extreme favoritism for the nicer neighborhoods further east. / High-density housing is making this city dark by blocking out the sun, and ugly because most of the architectural designs are hideously modern and don't blend well with the neighborhoods. It's also encouraging a lot of growth that I don't feel the city is equipped to handle (mostly regarding parking and traffic, which is already too much of a nightmare, especially in Sugarhouse). Part of what makes Salt Lake City so great is the small city charm and I feel that's been corrupted over the last few years by this project. / Erroneous bike lines are popping up everywhere. 1700 South is too narrow as it is and now it's going to be shut down for an indefinite amount of time again! I've heard half, if not all, of the street parking will be eliminated. Where are people without driveways or with multiple cars supposed to park? The city government seems to be giving a lot of favoritism to bicyclists that happens to be detrimental to vehicle drivers. While I understand bicycles are cheap and environmentally friendly, most people in this city have to favor cars because it is just too spread out, and public transportation is unfeasible and unreliable (especially if you live downtown and work in West Valley or Sandy).

I live downtown, I wanted the questionnaire to address the issues of homeless/ panhandlers/ drug culture that affects everyone trying to negotiate their way around downtown--no mention in this survey at all. / / I wanted to add that not having a TRAX line that goes directly from downtown to the University and Medical Center is short sighted. The people who live close to town are the ones who want to use public transportation exclusively but it is not possible with the lack of weekend and late night service. The inconvenience of public transportation seems only to increase with few late night busses, and a TRAX ride from the University that takes close to 45 minute by the time one changes trains. When a class at the U ends at 10 pm, one is lucky to make it back to downtown before 11.

I wish you'd asked about the 3rd South parking/bike path fiasco.

I am strongly opposed to spending more money on the Sugarhouse Streetcar. I would also like to see more money spent on improving street lighting and our crumbling sidewalks.

Overall, we love SLC! Here are our three top concerns: / 1) Improving air quality during inversion: perhaps fund research to address this? / 2) Enforcing noise ordinances on commercial businesses: We live near the zoo, and the commercial sounds (e.g. associated with the dinosaur exhibit and zoolights at Christmas) are nearly unbearable. Even after contacting zoo officials many times to request that the volume on these exhibits be lowered, the officials are only sometimes responsive and have flat out told us (the neighbors) that the city "would be on their side" in the event a dispute. Enforcing noise ordinances even on large businesses would help improve quality of life for people living nearby. / 3) Increasing bike lanes throughout the city, including on Foothill. Having more bike lanes throughout the city would help reduce automobile traffic and air pollution. For example, my husband and I work at the U and would love to ride our bikes to work if there were bike lanes on Foothill and throughout campus; as it is now, it's simply too risky for us to ride our bikes to work.

Need separate trash bin in our apartment for waste that can recycled.

I feel we need to build more trails in the foothills surrounding the valley, both biking and hiking. I also feel we need to have an off leash pet system. I feel the one in Millcreek canyon is very good, and in most instances regulates itself. If you have and odd/even day system it would be easy to write citations when the law is not followed. If you have a system based on time frames the it makes enforcement a bit more difficult, because citizen could say i lost track of time or, i started when it was good...

Some of the questions did not have diverse enough choices in order to make the choice clearly show the respondents intent to answer what they really feel. EXAMPLE: Rate bike lane availability - If the response is poor it could mean the respondent thinks there are too many bike lanes or that there are not enough.

The land north and west of the airport should be developed into an urban community with the help of the LDS church.

The questions are clearly lacking in regards to those residents that support Salt Lake City golf and strongly disagree with how the city is currently handling those resources.

Should have asked about corporate/organization campaign contribution limits.

Please, please try to get individual fire works banned in SLC. I was hoping that topic would be on the survey, but since it wasn't, I am bringing it up here. The fireworks set off in the neighborhoods are terrible for the environment, they scare the Vets who have had to serve in places like Irac, they absolutely petrify some dogs, they cause pollution and a mess on the streets, in this hot dry weather they could cause fires, and there is NO redeeming value in them!!! We literally have to leave the state for most of the month of July. SLC is wonderful except for fireworks.

Would like to comment on the answers and explain. example the expense of city projects that are very expensive but used by small % of population: bike lanes, 13 east tunnel, reason not shopping downtown the expense of parking spaces no longer free spaces in the city. Do not want idling vehicles but, decreased lanes causing many vehicles idling at traffic light especially 13th east.

I probably sound like an idiot in some of these responses. However, the things I have mentioned are things that have seriously concerned me of late. I tried to keep my remarks brief, so I did cut many corners in explaining various situations discussed here. I often feel, however, that, as citizens of a supposedly free nation, I frequently do question whether our government, at city, state and federal levels, is truly OF, FOR, and BY the people. I often feel fearful of those who claim to be "peace officers," particularly when I ride TRAX and watch the TRAX cops stopping people and demanding to see their proof-of-payment. I have seen these officers literally tackle and do injury to young people over a question of a \$2.50 fare. I believe the Salt Lake City cop who shot the kid at the 7-11 on 21st South & State Street last August should be kicked off the force. Please watch this newly-released bodycam tape, if you have not yet seen it. You cannot help but be sickened by it, and to be fearful of this officer, who, as I understand it, is still a member of the Salt Lake City Police force. We should NOT be fearful of those who claim to be working for us. I meant what I said about the Water Department employees, as well. Although not dangerous in the same way as an armed police officer, they are a cold bunch who see no reason to be civil to people, as far as I can tell.

I appreciate the opportunity to voice my opinion in this survey. This survey was designed very well for its purpose.

- We surveyed Salt Lake City residents via a mixed method survey live phone interviews as well as mail invitations to a web survey.
- Overall, city residents are happy with the way the city has been run.
- Most residents don't have negative opinions of city services, but many have little experience with city services. The most notable exceptions are street maintenance, stoplights, and parking kiosks.
- Citizens are generally satisfied with the quality of life in their neighborhoods, but there are opportunities for improvement.
- While the majority of residents believe most potential city initiatives are important, improving air quality was nearly unanimously most important.
- The majority of citizens who interacted with city staff were satisfied with their service experiences.

THINGS TO REMEMBER

SURVEY METHODOLOGY



Sampling frame consisted of a universe of all Salt Lake City residents. Online survey invitations were sent to addresses purchased from a commercial database vendor. Telephone interviews were conducted via Random Digit Dialing (RDD).

Using a software randomizer, we selected records for inclusion in the sample to achieve the intended sample size. In total, we sent 10,000 invitations.

Of the 10,000 mailed invitations, 469 were returned undeliverable. Of the remaining 9,351 invitations, 928 citizens responded with 857 completed online surveys. This results in a response rate of just below 9%.

857 completed online interviews among an estimated adult population of 148,165 results in a margin of error for the survey of plus or minus 3.35 percentage points. 400 completed telephone interviews results in a plus or minus 4.89 percentage point margin of error. Responses were weighted to better approximate city demographic composition as estimated by the U.S. Census.




RESPONDENT DEMOGRAPHIC COMPOSITION

We received low response rates among minorities, especially Hispanics.




CITY DIRECTION & PERCEPTIONS MAJORITY SATISFIED WITH SALT LAKE CITY

Overall, would you say Salt Lake City is headed in the right direction or the wrong direction?




SERVICES FOR TAX DOLLAR

Majority of residents rate Salt Lake City services as Good or Excellent.




In general, how do you rate the services you receive from Salt Lake City for your tax dollar?







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



Looking at neighborhood satisfaction by council district reveals interesting trends.




The large majority of residents feel very or somewhat safe both in their neighborhoods and in downtown Salt Lake during the day.



How safe do you feel when walking alone in the following places **DURING THE DAY?**




How safe residents feel in their neighborhoods during the day also varies by council district.



Residents feel significantly less safe in their neighborhoods and downtown at night.




How safe do you feel when walking alone in the following places **DURING THE NIGHT**?








PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION MANY DO NOT USE, BUT HAVE FAVORABLE OPINIONS


35% of respondents use public transportation monthly or more often, while nearly a quarter of respondents say they never use public transportation.



How often do you take public transportation when traveling around Salt Lake City?









Attended a cultural even such as a festival or fair (e.g. Farmer's market, Arts' Festival)



Used a public library



Shopped in the downtown area*







Visited a city park or natural lands



Visited a museum, the Leonardo, or the planetarium in the city



Used a bike lane or trail*








CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION LIMITS

Do you support or oppose a city ordinance that would **limit total contributions from individuals to campaigns** for political offices in Salt Lake City government to \$500 per election?




CITY STAFF MAJORITY HAVE POSITIVE EXPERIENCES

60% of residents have contacted a city office in the past year.




During the past year, have you contacted a Salt Lake City government office to get information, file a complaint, or obtain services?



Of the 60% of respondents who have contacted a city office within the past year, 77% were satisfied with the city's response.




Overall, were you satisfied or dissatisfied with the city's response(s)?



Overall, residents had positive experiences with city staff.





Of the 60% of respondents who have contacted a city office within the past year, the majority contacted the government offices by phone.




How did you contact the Salt Lake City government offices? (Select all that apply)




STATE PRISON RELOCATION
